## FUNCTIONS OF THE COUNCIL

The Social Science Research Council is the national organisation of Australian social scientists. It was founded on 21st August, 1952, and incorporated as an association on 3rd June, 1957. According to the Rules adopted by the Council at its meeting in Canberra on 6th June, 1957, the objects of the Research Council are:—

- (i) to encourage the advancement of the social sciences in Australia;
- (ii) to act as a co-ordinating group for the promotion of research and teaching in the social sciences;
- (iii) to foster research and to subsidise the publication of studies in the social sciences;
- (iv) to encourage and assist in the formation of other national associations or institutions for the promotion of the social sciences or any branch of them;
- (v) to act as the Australian national member of international organisations concerned with the social sciences; and
- (vi) to act as consultant and adviser in regard to the social sciences.

(The rules are printed in full in Annual Reports of the Council up to 1961).

The Council has been an affiliated member of the International Sociological Association since its inception, and has been regularly represented at the triennial congresses of the Association.

The Council's activities are supported by an annual grant of £5,000 from the Commonwealth Government, and to assist in its launching the government grants were generously matched by annual grants from the Carnegie Corporation of New York for a non-recurrent five-year period. The dual flow of funds in

those years enabled Council not only to experiment with varied annual programmes, but also to place some funds in a reserve which has been carefully husbanded for the financing of larger projects organised by the Council itself. This side of the Council's work has been actively developed in recent years, as described in the Annual Report under the heading of Major Research Projects. It is much to be hoped that the Commonwealth and Carnegie benefactions will be further supplemented by financial support from non-official bodies and individuals in Australia.

Apart from major projects, the Council's current activities include the award of grants (other than personal salary) to individual research workers; the award of supplementary travel grants for research in South-east Asia; subsidies to assist the publication of learned journals and books in the social science field; and publication from time to time of consolidated bibliographies of research in the social sciences in Australia. South-east Asia travel grants are made at the May meetings of the Executive Committee, and other awards are decided at the Executive meetings in May and October of each year.



## ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1963

### MAJOR RESEARCH PROJECTS

*The role of women in Australia.* Mr. Norman MacKenzie's book, reporting the Council's first major project, received much favourable notice in Australia and abroad, and the edition sold rapidly without necessitating any call on the Council's financial guarantee. The book has been used as a theme and text for study by women's organisations, television and radio panels, and adult education discussion groups and summer schools.

*Income taxation in Australia.* The report on this second major project was completed during the year. Professor P. H. Karmel had to withdraw from the Project Committee on his appointment in February to the Commonwealth Government's Committee of Economic Enquiry.

Under the names of the remaining members, Professor R. I. Downing (Chairman), Professor H. W. Arndt, Mr. A. H. Boxer and Professor R. L. Mathews, arrangements were made with Melbourne University Press for publication of the Report, in both cloth and paperback editions, in March 1964.

*Aborigines in Australian Society.* In consultation with the Myer Foundation of Melbourne, which has promised substantial financial support, this topic was selected for Council's third major research project, which is planned to take three years. It is supervised by a Project Committee consisting of Professor W. D. Borrie (Chairman), Professor R. M. Berndt, Dr. H. C. Coombs, Professor A. P. Elkin, Professor W. R. Geddes, Professor C. A. Gibb, Professor G. H. Lawton and Professor Sir Fred Schonell.

Mr. C. D. Rowley, M.A., former Principal of the Australian School of Pacific Administration, has been appointed full-time Director of the Project, to take up duty on 12th March, 1964. Its main purpose is to elucidate problems arising from contacts between Aborigines and non-Aborigines and to formulate policy implications of the findings. Council here records its appreciation of the generous support and co-operation of the Myer Foundation, and of the positive response of all Australian Governments to the proposals for this research.

*The Metropolis in Australia.* Council adopted this as a major research project next in priority to that on Aborigines, and authorised as a first step a conference on the state of research in the subject. In collaboration with Professor W. D. Borrie and Professor R. S. Parker working as a Seminar Committee, Professor N. G. Butlin arranged a seminar of over 30 scholars from different



disciplines, for January 1964, with plans for appointment of an Editorial Committee to supervise publication of the Seminar proceedings, and a second committee to consider proposals for establishing a permanent institute of urban research.

#### OTHER SPONSORED PROJECTS

*Social science research in Australian universities.* Council appointed Professor O. A. Oeser as Convenor of a sub-committee including also Professor J. Andrews and Professor Z. Cowen, to organise studies of the adequacy of facilities available for social science research in Australian universities, including finance, trained personnel, provision for post-graduate work and opportunities for publication, and of the adequacy of the present coverage of the various fields of social science research.

#### INDIVIDUAL RESEARCH GRANTS

The Executive Committee at its meeting on October 23 considered five applications for research grants and approved two grants to a total of £200. The following table shows the amounts and purposes of the grants awarded.

The total expenditure on individual research grants during 1963 was £1,395, and the amount carried forward to 1964 was £150.

### SOUTH-EAST ASIAN RESEARCH TRAVEL GRANTS

In 1963 the Council removed the limit of three on the number of grants offered to supplement other funds available to applicants for travel and incidental expenses involved in post-graduate research in South-east Asia. The grants are of not more than £150 a month, or £600 in all, and the area for which they are available includes the countries on the south-east borders of Asia from the Indian sub-continent to Japan, inclusive, and also Indonesia and the Philippines, but not New Guinea or the Pacific Islands.

### SUBSIDIES TO LEARNED JOURNALS

Council's objective in assisting the publication of research is furthered partly by supporting learned journals which find it difficult to meet costs while maintaining high academic and production standards. In such cases, of course, Council is concerned to ensure that the journal is economically managed and that all reasonable efforts have been made to increase its revenue from other sources. #### SEMINAR ON ECONOMETRICS

Council approved a grant of £250 to Professor H. F. Lydall of the University of Adelaide towards the expenses of a Seminar on Econometrics, held 13-15 August, 1963. As the need proved less than was expected, a sum of £64.25 was refunded to Council in October 1963.

#### PUBLICATION ASSISTANCE FOR MANUSCRIPTS

Dr. P. N. Tarling's book, *Piracy and Politics in the Malay World*, was published during the year, aided by an outright grant of £300 and a guarantee against loss up to a further £300. Council also made a grant of £200 towards publication of *An Australasian Bibliography of Agricultural Economics*, by Dr. John L. Dillon, of the University of Adelaide, and undertook to subsidise up to £150 the publication of *Sydney Studies in Politics*, Monograph No. 5: "Marx, Engels and Australia", by Mr. Henry Mayer.

#### BIBLIOGRAPHY OF RESEARCH IN THE SOCIAL SCIENCES

Preparatory work was begun on compiling a third issue of the Council's Bibliography of social science research, to cover the period 1960-1963. The previous issues covered the periods 1954-1957 and 1957-60 respectively.
