

EDUCATION AND SCIENCE

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PUBLICLY FUNDED EDUCATION was introduced into eastern Australia partly as a form of preventive poor relief. In 1823 the Colonial Office was advised that public education in Australia should aim for 'the effectual separation' of children from the corrupting influence of parents 'in the lower classes', particularly those of convict origin. Unfortunately the efficiency of the system was bedevilled by the denominational rivalry of publicly funded church schools. The history of popular education in the mid-nineteenth century is dominated by the struggle of utilitarian reformers to wrest control from the clergy. These reformers believed that ignorance and immorality could be checked through methodical advances in popular rationality, civil obedience, domestic discipline and productive labour, virtues in which children, especially those of the lower social orders, could be effectively schooled under state regulation.

In all the colonies, public education was decisively affected at various times by legislation making it 'secular' by withdrawing state aid from church schools, by providing free basic instruction in state schools, by making school attendance compulsory, and by centralising control of public schools in a state department under ministerial control. Under the impact of this legislation, popular education in late nineteenth-century Australia was divided among the tightly regulated state school systems, the volatile market in small private schools, and the enterprise of the large Roman Catholic minority.

Mass elementary schooling meant the creation of a large occupational group, the public teaching services, which offered a poorly paid but respectable occupation for men, and new opportunities for women, most of whom took subordinate posts. Women sometimes occupied senior positions in private schools, but salaries and working conditions in these schools were often inferior to those in state schools.

By 1900, the main policy development in public education, initially in New South Wales and Victoria, was in technical education, expressing the growing official belief that popular education should serve the interests of national efficiency. Various kinds of post-primary vocational schooling developed, and state high schools began to provide opportunities on a selective entry for a small minority. By the 1920s, governments claimed to have provided an educational ladder from primary school to university (with branches leading to technical qualifications, school certificates, and other credentials) which pupils climbed by passing through an elaborate system

of public examinations. This was intended to ensure the principle of equal access to educational opportunity.

The mid-1950s saw the development of the Commonwealth Office of Education and a commitment to mass secondary schooling. University enrolments and the creation of new universities, reflected the impact of economic growth, selective opportunity and a rising meritocracy. Reform policies of the 1970s reflected concern for school retention rates of pupils over fifteen years of age. By the 1980s, government involvement in institutionalised learning, established over a century earlier for the instruction of the children of the lower social orders, had developed into a vast network of kindergartens, schools, universities and colleges.



Australia has a long tradition of public support for science, beginning in the early colonial period with the establishment of observatories, meteorological stations, botanical and zoological gardens and museums. Scientific work was also encouraged by the colonial adoption of the British patent system, which offered protection to researchers, inventors and innovators. Prior to federation each colony had its own laws, but the Patents Act of 1903 established a standard system, with powers vested in the commonwealth government. Private enterprise, though often with government patronage, played a role in encouraging the discussion and dissemination of scientific ideas through the various Royal Societies, though the definition of what was considered science has changed considerably over time.

During the twentieth century the commonwealth government has played an increasingly important role in the funding of scientific research. In recent years Australian governments and Australian industry have been criticised for their lack of interest in and funding of scientific and technological development. In his book *Sleepers, wake!* (1982), Barry Jones, a minister in the Hawke Labor government, pointed out that Australia spent less per capita on research and development than most other modern industrial societies.





SOUTH AUSTRALIA 1876-1905






