

# SOCIAL WELFARE

**S**OCLAL WELFARE is the provision by government or private agency, from taxation or charitable gift, of a minimum standard of socially determined decency for persons in danger of falling below that level. In Australia public and private support for Aborigines and ex-servicemen has mostly been regarded as less stigmatised than social welfare, though in reality such distinctions have been politically based.

Nineteenth-century ‘charity’ concentrated on the ‘deserving poor’ who were considered to be unable to sustain themselves. They included cripples, aged bedridden people, widows with large families, and orphans and deserted children. Those poor decreed ‘able-bodied’ were expected to find paid work and thereby avoid regular dependence on handouts. Some services were and still are provided to everyone, for example, government hospitals and schools, although continuing efforts have been made to get the users of such services to pay. The most recent method, in the case of hospitals, being Medibank levies and compulsory health insurance.

Governor King recognised that orphaned children needed care and set up an asylum in 1801. Similar asylums were erected in other colonies, often by voluntary charities. These large institutions attracted the criticisms that they were harsh and conducive to habitual dependence. Their steady growth was slowed by the resort to boarding out and foster care schemes from 1865 to 1886. The fostering family received weekly payments and were inspected regularly. By the 1970s the language shifted to maintaining what was called the natural family unit.

In the nineteenth century, women with large families bereft of a male breadwinner were helped after enquiry, usually with rations, or a source of income, whether employment or a mangle, but rarely with cash. Men with severe disabilities were treated similarly. There has been no Poor Law in Australia, that is, communities have not been compelled to tax themselves to pay for the maintenance of old, sick or unemployed people, as they have done in England and the United States. Most aid took the form of selective charity by the donor authority.

By the 1890s some reformers argued, as did their counterparts in other countries, that the contribution made by people through their working years to the economy entitled them to state assistance when it was required, notably in old age. In 1900 the New South Wales and Victorian parliaments introduced age pensions as means-tested benefits claimable as a right. Queensland followed in 1907 and the Commonwealth in 1908. The value has remained between one-fifth and one-quarter of the minimum wage.

Many voluntary agencies were established in the nineteenth century. They were usually based on Christian ideals and often focused on the needs of women or children. They were generally conducted with devotion, economy and personal satisfaction by middle-class women and men. During the last fifty years costs and changing perceptions of need have led to the disappearance of many of these agencies, some being taken over by government or transformed under government supervision in return for subsidy.

Since World War II services have mainly been provided by governments for defined categories of need through direct cash grants, or through aid to voluntary agencies. The former include maternity allowance, family allowance or child endowment, widow's pensions, unemployment benefit and supporting parent benefit. Many of these payments have been justified by the argument that they are made to people unable to support themselves. Most have been paid by the federal government; state governments have been left with a residue of difficult cases, although over the last decade their welfare departments have initiated programs designed to break cycles of dependence. Meanwhile, the categories of persons in need have changed dramatically. Progress in preventive and curative medicine has reduced the number of child cripples, for example, while changes in mores have enlarged the number of single mothers and children below the accepted level of decency, 'the poverty line'.

Social welfare can also mean the massive expenditure by government outside the marketplace of taxes for the whole community, on education, housing and health. Increasingly, articulate citizens and publicists acting on behalf of categories seen as relatively deprived have demanded services from their governments as part of the bargain of citizenship in war and peace. Politicians have responded with calculated promises, especially at election time. Thus defined, expenditure has trebled for the federal government since 1941, while total government outlay on such expenses represents nearly half of all government expenses.

Social welfare, whether defined narrowly or broadly, has always been controversial. The poor have been blamed for their poverty but their spokespersons have rejected such blame and claimed assistance for them as citizens rather than paupers. Access to welfare redistribution has been qualified by tests of means, assets or moral worth, which produce arguments about the margin of entitlement and the interference of officials. Growing proportions of government income spent on welfare are challenged by alternative claims; some claim that this spending even threatens the survival of the market economy. Other claims assert that the burden of welfare taxation is largely borne by the tax-paying working class. Certainly large numbers of middle-class people draw their income and self-esteem by running the welfare industry. Some call for a fuller transfer of wealth from the rich to the poor, while others resist in the name of self-help and independence. Whether government leadership is necessary or destructive, whether voluntary agencies are instruments of social control or vehicles of creative social reform, remain open questions.
