ARC ERA National Report

The Australian Research Council has released the State of Australian University Research 2018–19: ERA National Report.

The report provides the outcomes of the fourth round of Excellence in Research for Australia (ERA) —evaluating the quality of Australian university research, benchmarked against world standards in a comprehensive way.

The longitudinal data available is extensive covering up to 14 years of research activity and clearly shows the significant growth and improvement in quality of the research produced by the Australian higher education research institutions across that time.

ARC EI 2018–19 National Report

The Australian Research Council has released the *Engagement and Impact Assessment 2018–19 National Report.*

The EI National Report presents the outcomes of the inaugural nation-wide assessment of university research engagement and impact. It presents an assessment of how institutions are translating their research into economic, environmental, social and other benefits and provides information on research engagement, impact and approach to impact for disciplines at each eligible Australian bink on education institution Australian higher education institution.
